According to various reports in regard to health insurance cover and access to health care, they typically provide different rates for the children, teenagers under 18 years and elderly adults. Also there is a proper documentation which shows that the young adults are among those at high risk of the uninsured (Congress, 2019). This prompts a huge health policy issue and the need to review the factors related to access to healthcare among children under the age of 18 in the United States (Sticher, 2020).

This topic is very important for study because when there is a reduction of children coverage due to social economic status or citizenship it means that few children are going to get required access to healthcare including immunization and child visits. A reduction of federal Medicaid financing means increased pressure on the providers and the state. This topic is very important as it argues that children should continue to receive Medicaid even when they are privately insured or not; this also calls for changes in eligibility due to the fact that children under 18 years, with families of low income levels, or undocumented immigrant children are currently not qualified for Medicaid or Child Health Insurance Program (CHIP) (Medicaid, 2020).

It is important to have free access to healthcare for children because lack of it could also lead to broader effects in education, health and their financial success as adults (Office of Disease Prevention and Health Promotion (ODPHP), 2020). It is thus important to review this policy issue since access to care is expected to shift due to the fluctuations in health insurance among children under 18 years, in this regard their healthcare needs are also going to change prompting new challenges from the childhood to adult care.
